Report on Meeting of NZART ALO with NZ Administration MED

Notes of Meeting held on Wednesday 9 April between Wayne Wedderspoon, MED (Ministry of Economic Development) and Don Wallace, NZART Administration Liaison Officer (ALO)

Digital Broadcasting Review of Regulation

Wayne noted that this review is currently underway and, while it is primarily aimed at broadcasting, there is potential for impact on the amateur service and suggested that NZART study the paper and submissions.

ZLxExxx (ex AREC) Callsigns

Don noted that the intention to reserve these callsigns was not included in the current (March 2008) version of PIB46.

Wayne suggested that the best way forward was for NZART to recommend an amendment to PIB46 to cover these callsigns.

Amateur Allocation at 500 kHz

Don noted that the ITU-R is currently considering an international allocation to amateurs of part of the old 500 kHz distress frequency band and that some NZ amateurs had already requested an allocation.

Wayne noted that it was likely to be some time before an international allocation would be available but that NZART might consider applying (to Radio Spectrum Policy and Planning) for a temporary interim allocation on a non-interference basis under footnote 4 of the Schedule of the GURL.

ZK2 and ZK 3 Callsigns

Don asked whether there was any update as to whether Niue and Tokelau are using the (New Zealand) ZK2 and ZK3 callsign series.

Wayne said that they had made an informal approach but had not received a reply from either Niue and Tokelau. At some point Niue and Tokelau may wish follow the Cook Islands lead with an ITU series outside ZK, ZL and ZM and that would be an appropriate time to review the allocations. He also said that MED records of the allocation history of many callsign series, particularly ZK2 and ZK3, are fairly sparse and any historical documentation that NZART members could point to would be helpful..

KiwiSAT

Don noted that Terry Carrel is working directly with Alex Orange on the registration of this satellite with the ITU.

Wayne said that while NZ (i.e. the MED) will handle the registration of the satellite with the ITU, it will not licence it. Apparently, different countries take different approaches to the licensing of satellites. In general, satellites providing services into New Zealand (of which there are many) are not licensed. Licences are granted, however, to protect commercial satellite reception at specified locations from terrestrial fixed services.

SSB on 10 MHz

Don noted that an NZART member had stated that Australian amateurs were using SSB on their 10 MHz and had raised a question as to whether New Zealand and/or Australian amateurs should be using SSB in this allocation.

Wayne responded that the amateur licence only specified that amateurs must comply with the latest ITU-R recommendations (See Notice 5 (6) to the GURL) but, as far as he was aware, these did not specify the mode to be used on this band. He saw this as an NZART band-planning rather than an MED issue.

Entry Level Licence

Don noted that NZART is looking at the possibility of introducing an entry level amateur licence to NZ similar to those in the UK and Australia and asked what the MED's attitude would be to a request for such a licence in NZ. Don also left a copy of the Australian manual with Wayne so he could see how the system operates there.

Wayne replied that the Foundation Licence concept in both the UK and Australia appeared to have been very successful. He thought that such a request would be received positively but would need to be carefully differentiated from the (cancelled) novice licence. He noted that this would probably require:

* amendments to Schedule 4 of the Radiocommunications regulations to accommodate the new certificate and its syllabus (not likely before next year);

- * amendments to the GURL to add the additional certificate and to state which frequencies are to be used (relatively simple to implement);
- * a new range of callsigns in PIB46 (relatively simple to implement);
- * an additional licence class in SMART for Approved Radio Examiners to issue (relatively simple to implement);

Repeater Fees

Don noted that various NZART members had been enquiring about mechanisms available to relieve NZART branches of the charges associated with repeater licensing.

Wayne said that he is fully aware of the ongoing issue. MED is not against reducing or eliminating repeater licensing fees, but there are equity issues with other voluntary public good spectrum users and Treasury rules require that there be no cross-subsidisation between different classes of users (including between operators and repeaters etc). The effect of this is that the costs associated with licensing repeaters have to be met - either by the licensees of the installations concerned or by some other funding mechanism - but not other licensees.

Single Letter Callsigns

Don asked for feedback on the latest draft of the paper on single letter callsigns.

Wayne said that the proposal made sense but that minor changes were needed in the following areas:

- * As NZART is not the only potential approved radio examiner (ARX) for amateurs, the present references to NZART ARXs need to be changed to Amateur ARXs;
- * For the same reason, the reallocation rules need to be clear so that both NZART and non-NZART ARXs will interpret them in the same way
- * The rules need to clearly state which callsign series (e.g. ZL1 - 4, ZL 5, etc) are covered by the proposed rule change.

Report to NZART Council from the IARU Overseas Liaison Committee

The past year has been a busy one for the committee with preparations for WRC-07 and coordination within IARU. Other organisational matters, outlined below, have also occupied committee members as preparations begin for the next IARU Region-3 Association conference in 2009. Being midway between these triennial events, the committee is committed to identifying matters which may require addressing in 2009 and monitoring the activities at the conference of the other two IARU regional associations.

At Bangalore in August 2006, NZART successfully bid to host the 14th Triennial IARU Region-3 Association Conference in New Zealand, October 2009. This is a conference of Delegates and hosting it in New Zealand is both a privilege, and considerable cost saving to the Association in overseas travel.

The Conference expenses are met by the IARU Region-3 Association with the expenses of NZART being confined to the cost of our own delegate's attendance, some minor incidentals and hosting a reception for those attending. Sponsorship is being sought to further minimise these costs.

On behalf of NZART Council, the Liaison Committee has booked the Scenic Circle's Cotswold Hotel, Papanui Road, Christchurch as the venue for the Conference. The hotel has generously made additional facilities available to the conference at no extra cost. A committee is being formed to handle the details of registration, finances, services and partner activities. Further details will appear in Break In as arrangements are finalised.

Unlike an NZART Conference, attendance is by registration only and is restricted to the representative of the Member Societies, IARU Officials and invited officials. Some 100 delegates and observers (including partners) are expected to attend representing the wide range of countries whose member Societies make up our Region-3 Association. Representatives are also expected from the IARU Secretariat, IARU Region-1 and IARU region-2.

Our Administration, the MED invited NZART to participate in the NZL team attending WRC-07. Peter Lake ZL2AZ, accepted this task and attended the meeting as a member of the MED delegation. Full coverage of this important meeting has been comprehensively reported on by Peter.

NZART records it thanks to Peter for his outstanding work and commitment both to NZART and the IARU Region-3.

ZL2SJ Peter Norden has been appointed the NZART coordinator in the Amateur Radio on the International Space Station (ARISS) program. ARISS is a volunteer program which aims to inspire students, worldwide, to pursue careers in science, technology, engineering and math through amateur radio communications opportunities with the International Space Station (ISS) on-orbit crew.

IARU Region 3 is 40 Years Old

Extracted From IARU Region 3 Newsletter Issue 9

This month marks the 40th anniversary of the formation of Region 3 and we have some details available on how the region has progressed.

IARU Region 3 was formed in 1968 at its Inaugural meeting, held in conjunction with the 1968 Federal Convention of the WIA.

Those present at this meeting were Harry Burton ZL2APC from Wellington, New Zealand, as well as Tom Clarkson ZL2AZ, also from Wellington, New Zealand. Then, from Newton, Iowa, USA was Bob Denniston W0DX, the President of the IARU. From Manila, Philippines was Emilio Asisitores DU1EA, and from Tokyo, Japan Kan Mizoguchi JA1BK and Ken-ichi Kajii JA1FG. So, the societies represented at the Inaugural Congress were JARL, NZART, PARS (PARA) and the WIA and, of the course, the IARU.

As we celebrate the 40 years of IARU Region 3 we salute those who had the wisdom to bring Region 3 into existence, all those years ago in Sydney, Australia.

Out and About

Atom-Thick Transistors

Scientists have made the world's thinnest ever transistors. These are the devices that switch current on and off in all electronic equipment. At their very smallest, the new transistors are just one atom thick and ten atoms wide. They're made of a material called graphene, which is made by joining carbon atoms together, forming a flat sheet.

The tiny transistors may herald a new breed of computer chips smaller and faster than our current ones based on silicon. However, it is too early to promise graphene supercomputers, as no existing technology allows the cutting materials with true nanometre (0.000 000 001 m) precision. But this is exactly the same challenge that all post-silicon electronics has to face. At least we now have a material that can meet such a challenge.

Australia Issues Class Licence For Visiting Amateurs

The Wireless Institute of Australia advises that on 14 February 2008 a Class Licence issued by the Australian regulator, the Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA), allowing visiting amateurs to operate while in Australia came into effect.

The Class Licence is issued under the Australian Radiocommunication Legislation, and allows any overseas amateur visiting Australia to operate for up to 90 days after each entry to Australia. A visiting amateur does not have to make any application or payment to operate, but must hold evidence of a licence or qualification recognized by ACMA and a call sign issued by the administration that issued the licence or qualification.

The Class Licence may be found on the WIA's website www.wia.org.au.

The level of operation, which range from the privileges and bands allowed to the Australian Advanced licence to a 146 to 148 MHz low power FM licence (essentially for hand held operation), depends on the level of the overseas licence.

Overseas licences and the equivalent level are set out in the Table of Equivalent Qualifications and Licences, which can be found on the ACMA's website. The URL for the part of the ACMA site 'Apparatus Licensing Amateurs Visiting Australia' that includes the table is:
