An Engineering Evaluation, in accordance with the MED's Radio Licence Certification Rules (PIB38), shows that the transmit frequency can remain on 146.025 MHz and the receive frequency can remain on 146.625 MHz, and that there will be no interference to other stations.
2. **Branch 74 Wellington VHF** has applied to relocate its 70 centimetre Bulletin Board to Ngaio Reservoir, Topo50 map reference BQ31 494.92 316.02. An Engineering Evaluation, in accordance with the MED's Radio Licence Certification Rules (PIB38), shows that the transmit frequency can remain on 434.875 MHz and the receive frequency can remain on 439.875 MHz, and that there will be no interference to other stations.
3. **Branch 74 Wellington VHF** has applied to change the frequency of the 70 centimetre repeater located at Ngaio Reservoir, Topo50 map reference BQ31 494.92 316.02. The transmit frequency will be 434.550 MHz and the receive frequency will be 439.550 MHz. An Engineering Evaluation, in accordance with the MED's Radio Licence Certification Rules (PIB38), shows that there will be no interference to other stations.

Rescue Radio: The Christchurch New Zealand Earthquake Story Continues

Ham radio continues to be an important factor in rescue and recovery efforts in the wake of the earthquake that hit Christchurch, New Zealand, on Tuesday, February 22nd. Jim Meachen, ZL2BHF, is several hundred miles to the North in Auckland with the latest:

ZL4FZ: "At this stage were still extensively supporting the Land SAR operation that's the more major component. Today with 300 searchers in the field we have deployed probably 50 radios to teams of operators and each of those teams has each got its own radios. There are about an actual 250 staff on foot in the field and all of that communications is coming back through AREC"

That's Richard Smart, ZL4FZ, who is head of the Amateur Radio Emergency Communications team explaining the role that his emergency communications group is currently playing in the aftermath of the 6.3 earthquake. A quake that as of airtime is believed responsible for at least 160 deaths and scores of injuries in and around the Christchurch area. According to Smart ham radio was on scene from the time the quake hit and right through the present:

ZL4FZ: "AREC involvement in the Christchurch earthquake has been to support Civil Defence directly with the welfare centers, initially at the temporary welfare center in Hagley Park. (This is) a small tent city where AREC provided effectively a complete communications terminal right through to the extensive support for the Land SAR operation which has been visiting every home in the Western suburb of Christchurch. To date a total of some eighteen thousand homes have been visited by the Land SAR teams and the AREC teams have provided communications for upward of 300 volunteers in the field at any one time."

Smart tells Amateur Radio Newline that it's the ability of hams to quickly adapt and respond to any emergency that makes them valuable in situations such as this. He also says that those in charge of relief efforts are very satisfied with the AREC ham radio operations:

ZL4FZ: "I believe in this case that AREC has managed to provide a solution to unforeseen communications difficulties, and in the case of the Land SAR deployment particularly because it has become a linchpin to allow the operation to work."

"We have been told by the senior management for the Land SAR operation that basically it would not have been possible to achieve what they have achieved which is spectacular in its own right, without the assistance of AREC in that role."

So what role will AREC play as recovery efforts continue? ZL4FZ says that at this moment it's hard to say:

ZL4FZ: "It's very difficult to tell at this stage and the difficulty is that there are a number of significant issues that the city is facing and there are a number of agencies involved, obviously with specializations in different areas. One of the things the Civil Defence emergency management teams are working on is setting the appropriate team for the tasks that they have. And at this stage, while this tasking is drawing nearer to a close, we are waiting word as to what the next tasking may be."

The story of the Christchurch earthquake and the part being played by ham radio in post quake recovery efforts is far from over and we will have more for you in future Amateur Radio Newline reports. From Auckland, on the North Island of New Zealand, I'm Jim Meachen, ZL2BHF, reporting

for the Amateur Radio Newline.

It has to be noted that so far, this has been a VHF only operation. Word from the New Zealand Association of Radio Transmitters is that hams providing communications support in the aftermath of the quake are using only 2 meter FM. No High Frequency communications into and out of the Christchurch area has been found to be necessary.

Report on Proposed Amateur Allocation Around 500 kHz

From The ITU Conference Preparatory Meeting for WRC-12 Geneva, 14-25 February 2011

I'm pleased to report that Document 175(Rev. 1) was adopted by Plenary this afternoon without meaningful comment or change. See attached. This completes the work of the CPM on Agenda Item 1.23.

Removal of the original Method A came about because there was no administration support for retaining it. Given that, it is just as well that it has been deleted in order to avoid confusion. I believe there is more support now for some form of amateur allocation below 487 kHz than there was at the beginning of the CPM.

Congratulations to all concerned and especially to Ken Pulfer.

Scientists Warn of Solar 'Katrina'

The Sun and its activity plays an important part in amateur radio. What the events, described below, will do with the propagation of our radio waves, we will have to wait and see. It looks serious. EDITOR

Excerpt:

'...The sun is waking up from a long quiet spell. Last week it sent out the strongest flare for four years – and scientists are warning that earth should prepare for an intense electromagnetic storm that, in the worst case, could be a “global Katrina” costing the world economy \$2,000bn.

Senior officials responsible for policy on solar storms – also known as space weather – in the US, UK and Sweden urged more preparedness at the annual meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in Washington.

“We have to take the issue of space weather seriously,” said Sir John Beddington, UK chief scientist. “The sun is coming out of a quiet period, and our vulnerability has increased since the last solar maximum [around 2000].”.....'

Web Update

Redesign of LINKS on The NZART Web

A complete redesign has taken place from the opening page to the presentation of the links.

The links selection is now in two pages, broken into A to I and L to W. This allows descriptive menu names. The single letter has been removed and has been replaced with a name that relates to the main subject of the link. The name is shown on the opening page in a larger size bold type. Also you can see the other subjects that belong to the particular link with the separator between the names being the spade symbol.

In the level two menu, which is under the main menu, entries of L-W and A-I are found. These allow easy navigation between the two pages of the links section.

Also added is a menu heading of 'Feedback(1)'. Suggestions and notification of broken links can be done with very little effort.

A list of the links are clearly shown when a link page is opened, with the major list being closes to the Page Links menu column.

The Quick Navigation section on the bottom of each page, also shows the Links entries. I fitted it in where I could.

NZART Amateur of the Year Award Rules

Presented at NZART Annual Conference

Award to be made to the radio amateur who in the preceding 12 month calendar year (January to December) has given outstanding service to Amateur Radio.

Criteria

1. Nominees must be active in more than one aspect of amateur radio and in these to have shown extraordinary service to their fellow amateurs,
2. The nominee must be a current member of NZART, and
3. The nominee should be unaware of the nominations.

Nominations

1. Nominations to be made to the President of NZART (at current address) to reach the President by May 1st following the year under review,
2. Nominations must be made through the Secretary of a Branch of NZART, and
3. Points of "service rendered" must be tabulated and certified as correct by the Branch Chairman (except that two other officers would be accepted if the circumstances warrant) and these must refer only to the 12 month period under review. Through these, the reason why the nominee should be considered must be clearly evident.

The President will decide on the Award allocation reporting the result to Council immediately prior to the Annual General Meeting. It is possible that in some years no award would be made even though recommendations were received.

NZART The Young Amateur of the Year Award Rules

To Recognise The Young Amateur of the Year

The Award Objectives

Objectives of the Award is for NZART (and a co-sponsor) to demonstrate and encourage interest in promoting technological awareness and education in the field of radio and electronics by involving young people in Amateur Radio and to focus the activities of our younger Amateur Radio operators into achieving excellence in all aspects of the hobby, both individually and within the fellowship that belonging to Amateur Radio brings.

Requirements to obtain The Young Amateur of the Year Award

The criteria for this award is:

1. Nominee to be under 18 years of age at April 1 in the year of presentation,
2. Nominee to have provided demonstrable service to Amateur Radio in any of the following areas of achievement:
3. Assistance with NZART Branch or activity,
4. Development of a significant project (hardware or software) for use in Amateur Radio, and
5. Participation in projects associated with the promotion of Amateur Radio.

The recipient will be presented at NZART Conference with:

1. A suitably endorsed framed certificate presented by NZART (and co-sponsor if applicable),
2. A voucher for \$100 to purchase books of the recipient's choice,
3. One years free subscription to NZART,
4. A presentation from any other Branch/Business/Individual who may wish from time to time, to co-sponsor the Award with NZART, and
5. Payment of half registration to NZART Conference if the recipient attends.
6. If no suitable nominations for the Young Amateur of the Year are received by April 1, no presentation will be made for that year,
7. Nominations for this award should be sent by Branches or individuals along with

- "substantiating evidence", to the General Secretary of NZART by MAY 1st in the year of presentation, and
8. The Young Amateur of the Year will be selected by a sub-committee appointed by Council.

Arthur (Jumbo) Godfrey Award Rules

The purpose of this award is to remember one of New Zealand's most well known radio amateurs, who fully supported NZART Inc and branch level activities, in the belief that strong branches meant a strong national organisation.

As there was/is a gap in this area of recognising branch level activities at a national level, this award has been instituted to not so much reward those who work at this most important level but to acknowledge to the rest of the amateur service the tireless work put in at the grass roots of amateur radio.

The Award is to be made to the radio amateur or non-transmitting branch member who in the opinion of the nominator(s) has given outstanding service to Amateur Radio at a branch level over a period of time that has not been recognized anywhere else.

Criteria

1. Nominees must be active in branch level activities and in these to have shown extraordinary service to their fellow branch members. Points of service rendered need to be presented to ensure that the nominee meets the purpose and vision of the award as outlined in the introduction,
2. The award is for the years prior to the award presentation. e.g. if award year is 2008, the period of time to be considered are those prior to 31 December 2007,
3. There are no limits on the number of nominees, however up to a maximum of three recipients can be awarded in any one year,
4. The nominee must be a current member of NZART,
5. The nominee must be a current member of the nominating branch, and
6. The nominee should be unaware of the nominations.

Nominations

1. Nominations to be made to the General Secretary of NZART (at current address) to reach the office by 1 May following the year(s) under review,
2. Nominations must be made through the Secretary of a Branch of NZART, and
3. Bullet points of "service rendered" must be tabulated and certified as correct by the Branch Chairman (except that two other officers would be accepted if the circumstances warrant) and these must refer to the period under review. Through these, the reason why the nominee should be considered must be clearly evident. In my capacity of General Secretary I will recommend those that meet the criteria of the Award to NZART Council for confirmation immediately prior to the Annual General Meeting. It is possible that in some years no award would be made even though nominations/recommendations were received.

Any branch that feels that they have members who would fit this criteria, please send their nominations to me before 1 December.
