If you are paying your subscription by credit card...please read the following:

VHF / UHF Field Day Contest 2021



The annual VHF UHF Field Day Contest is scheduled for the first weekend in December – this year that's the 4th and 5th of December.

Although it's called a "Field Day", this does not prevent home stations from taking part.

If you haven't taken part for some time, how about dusting off the rig and set aside some time to have a go. Most operation will be on 2m and 70cm and the frequencies to listen and call on are 144.2 MHz, 432.2 MHz If you've also got 6m, then the calling frequency is 50.15 MHz on 1296 MHz, look for stations on 1296.2 MHz Most SSB operation uses horizontally polarized antennas. If you are operating from a home station, and only have a vertically polarised antenna, still give it a go!

The contest starts at 1700 NZDT on Saturday 4 December and finishes at 2300 NZDT. On Sunday the 5th, activity gets underway again at 0700, but if that's a bit

early for you, just join in when you can on Sunday and the contest finishes at 1300. On both days the contest is divided up into one-hour periods, so starting at 1700 on Saturday, the first period is 1700 to 1800 NZDT. The aim is to work as many stations as possible during each hour but no repeat contacts on the same band please. You can work them again in the next hour and so on right through the contest.



"On the Radar"

The amateur radio fraternity has been generously gifted several brand-new copies of a book entitled, "On the Radar". They are cellophane wrapped as delivered from the printer. The book addresses in spectacular detail the establishment, staffing, operation and decommissioning of the World War 2 radar station which was sited 2km south of Piha on the west coast of the North Island.

Thirteen Chain Overseas Low (COL) radar stations were operated by the RNZN around New Zealand's coast from 1941 onwards, specifically to provide early

warning of the approach of unidentified ships or aircraft, the Imperial Japanese armed forces being the foremost threat in Defence Department minds.



The author, Sandra Coney, has thoroughly researched her topic, interviewed several radar engineers who installed equipment and maintained the station during its years of operation, including the venerable Ian Sexton, ZL1PZ. She has written a most informative, complete, and easily understood narrative to complement the collection of historic photographs.

The book retails for \$40 plus post, however clubs or individuals wanting a copy will pay only \$7.50 post, or free to collect from Levin. If interested please contact Stan, z13tk.radio@gmail.com

CWOPS Award for Advancing the Art of CW



CWops is pleased to announce that it is now accepting nominations for this prestigious award for the year 2022.

The purpose of the award is to recognise individuals, groups, or organisations that have made the greatest contribution(s) toward advancing the art or practice of radio communications by Morse code.

Criteria:

Candidates for the award may be one or more of the following:

1. Authors of publications related to CW
2. CW recruiters, trainers, mentors, coaches, and instructors
3. Public advocates of CW
4. Organizers of CW activities
5. Designers and inventors who advance the art or practice of CW
6. Other contributors to the art or practice of CW

Note:

The award is **not** limited to amateur radio operators or their organisations.

Nominations:

Nominations may be made by anybody (not limited to CWops members).

Nominations should be emailed to awards@cwops.org with a copy to secretary@cwops.org. An email confirmation will be sent acknowledging receipt of each nomination. In order to be considered, a nomination should be received by March 18, 2022, and include:

1. A detailed explanation supporting nominee qualifications according to the above criteria.
2. Name(s) and call sign(s) (if applicable) of nominee(s), and contact information including their postal address(es), email address(es), and telephone number(s).
3. Name, telephone number, email address, and call sign (if applicable) of the person submitting the nomination.

Presentation of Award:

A plaque will be presented at the Dayton Hamvention. If the recipients are not present, it will be sent to them.


